

# The United States recognized Colombia in **June 19th**, **1822**



The United States of America fifty years after independence have been declared. Map published in 1822 in Philadelphia.



The departments of Colombia known as "La Gran Colombia" in 1820.

**March 8th:** President James Monroe sends a message to the US Congress to recognize Colombia and other South American States as independent states from Spain.

**March 18th:** The Foreign Relations Committee from the House of Representatives recommends the recognition of Colombia.

**April 1st:** The US Congress approves a bill appropriating \$100,000USD to the diplomatic legations of the United States in the recognized colonies.

**May 4th:** President James Monroe signs the act on May 4th, 1822.

**June 19th:** US recognize Manuel Torres as the first Charge d'Affaires from Colombia.



Manuel Torres became the first charge d'Affairs of Colombia and first Latin American diplomatic in the United States. He was received by President James Monroe on June, 19th.

While serving in the US as Minister Plenipotentiary, Manuel Murillo Toro was elected President. President Lincoln, gave him use of a US Navy ship to take him to Colombia to begin his presidency.

President elect Enrique Olaya Herrera, was the first Colombian President to visit the White House. US President Herbert Hoover hosted him in June 1930. Franklin D. Roosevelt became the first US President to visit Colombia in 1934. Years later, he welcomed Dr. Alfonso Lopez Pumarejo, Presidentelect of Colombia to the White House on July 7, 1942.

Botanist Richard Schultes entered the Amazon rainforest on a mission to study how indigenous peoples used plants for medicinal, ritual and practical purposes.

Colombia supported the States United during World War II, declaring against Germany, Italy and Japan in 1943.

On November 5, 1945, after the ratification of the San Francisco Charter, Colombia joins the United Nations as a founding member.

Established in 1948 with the Bogotá signing of its Charter, the Organization of American States today constitutes the main governmental forum in the Hemisphere.

Colombia and the United States have long stood sidein defense by-side democracy including the Korean War, when Colombia answered the call of United Nations to participate.

President Clinton met with President Pastrana development initiative with US bipartisan support, was approved.

President George W. Bush and First Lady Laura Bush welcomed President Alvaro Uribe and his wife, at their ranch in Texas. During the Uribe Government, Bush traveled twice to Colombia.

Colombian President Alvaro Uribe and US President Barack Obama continued bilateral cooperation meeting twice in 2009.

Colombia became NATO's first Latin American partner. As part of this partnership, Colombia provides demining training to NATO allies and other partner countries.

Colombia officially became the 37th member of the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development on April 28th, being the third Member country from the Latin America region to join.

The US donates 6 millions vaccines to Colombia, as part of the Biden-Harris Administration's worldwide efforts to fight the COVID-19 pandemic.





#### **GDP % Annual Growth**





Three recorded instances of economic contraction in 100+ years










# Colombia is returning to normality faster than its regional peers



The index comprises eight indicators, split into three domains. The first grouping is transport and travel. The second looks at recreation and entertainment and the third is retailing and work.



The index compiles 12 data indicators such as: virus containment, quality of healthcare, vaccination coverage, overall mortality and progress toward restarting travel.

Colombia ranks 4th in The Economist's Global Normalcy Index amongst 50 of the world largest economies and 8th in Bloomberg's Covid Resilience Ranking.





# Colombia is an important destination of US exports



The US is the largest origin of Colombian imports accounting for 24% of all imports.








